

This time last year...

COVID struck Manitoba, and since then we have experienced an enduring crisis characterized by immense hardship and loss. Lost jobs and wages, led to more financial pressures and to more Manitobans struggling to put food on the table.

We saw an initial and dramatic surge in the need for food support including a 25% jump in new visitors. Food donations dropped 60% and we faced a critical shortage of volunteers. People were concerned about their safety, and we were concerned about how we would be able to sort and pack hampers to provide food support to everyone in need.

This past year was also marked by tremendous caring and generosity as Manitobans who could and did help to help feed their neighbours. With each request for help, you rallied to support us and the food banks and agencies who rely on us for food.

There was a steady stream of cars in our drive-thru food donation line, thousands of cash gifts, and as the shelves got stocked, more tins came in from grocery store bins. Your overwhelming support was critical to our efforts to distribute near 11 million pounds of food to people facing hunger last year.

Kids like Michael, who beamed from ear to ear, when he opened his hamper to find 2L of milk and a snack to fuel his learning.

The crisis is far from over, but as we start to roll out vaccines, there is hope. Thanks to Harvest Stars like you, we are still feeding an average of 80,000 Manitobans every month, 46% of whom are children, in 325+ communities across Manitoba.

We are committed to a vision of Manitoba where no one goes hungry. With deep gratitude, we thank you, our Harvest Stars, for all that you contribute each and every day to fill our Harvest Hampers, feed our neighbours and nourish our communities.

Accueil Kateri Centre Inc., Ste-Anne Harvest Manitoba Food Network Member Spotlight

Every second Wednesday, Accueil distributes up to 5 meals for about 140 registered clients and families. The population of the town of Ste-Anne is near 2000.

The food bank coordinator Armande Leclair said that because of COVID-19, they changed much of what they do to keep their volunteers and clients safe. This included operating with fewer volunteers at one time to safely distance, and employing a hamper numbering system so families could pick up their Hamper from a table outside and back to their car.



Accueil Kateri Centre was named after Kateri Tekakwitha, an Algonquin–Mohawk woman who was beatified in 1980 by Pope John Paul II and later canonized by Pope Benedict XVI at Saint Peter's Basilica on October 21, 2012.
