We survived 2021 thanks to our community of Harvest Stars!

Yup — COVID-19 has been a challenge for a lot of people in our community, and for Harvest. However, the fact Harvest survived because of community is a series of harrowing moments and heartening tales.

FACT: Traditional food donations fell by 300,000 pounds (30 per cent) but producers stepped up

It takes a province to feed a province. During COVID, the need went up and food donations went down as supply chains were interrupted and those who normally volunteer were in lockdown. We received crucial support from producers and farm families like the Dairy Farmers of Manitoba, MB Egg Farmers and Manitoba Chicken and Pork Producers.

FACT: Major grocers in Manitoba support Harvest in a significant way.

One of the most important connections between Harvest and our community is the Tin for the Bin program. In 90 grocery stores across the province, this is an easy way to help nourish hungry kids and families with a spontaneous gift of food (and hope). Amid all the craziness, this program continued. Manitobans generously adopted a buyone-for-me, bin-one-for-Harvest approach — and that helped maintain food donations levels during a time of great need.

FACT: 83,000 Manitobans, half of whom are children, now rely on Harvest for food.

Due to soaring food prices, the highest in 12 years, and no corresponding wage increase, Harvest had its biggest spike in applications for food support ever this fall — almost 76 per cent higher than the same period last year. Plus, Manitoba still has the highest child poverty rate of any province in Canada.

These are grim milestones, and yet, the fact is that somehow, Manitobans, all experiencing some effects of COVID, went 'beyond call of duty' efforts. The Harvest crew, volunteers, donors and partners worked together to ensure no hungry person was turned away from Harvest.

FACT: Volunteers are returning to the warehouse again.

Volunteers are the lifeblood of Harvest. In

our warehouse, they sort and pack almost 11 million pounds of food into Harvest hampers. Volunteer drivers deliver them to food banks and agencies across the province, and those agencies provide hampers to those in need. Simply, at Harvest and in our community, volunteerism is what keeps operations open and food flowing.

Since the pandemic began warehouse volunteer hours dropped by almost 50 per cent below normal capacity but now that Harvest is a fully vaccinated facility, individuals, friends, families, community groups and corporate teams have all begun to return, and we could not be more grateful.

FACT: The future is now.

In the coming year Harvest plans to grow every facet of the operation. However, because Manitoba still has the highest child poverty rate of any province in Canada, one priority given special attention will be feeding hungry kids through expanded food and meal programs, advocacy and province-wide community involvement.

Manitobans are and always have been a community of Harvest Stars. Harvest is one of the important ways we see ourselves. It reflects our values. And those values motivate our deeds. With a tin, a toonie, or some volunteer time, you bring to life the slogan: "We are a community of Harvest Stars."

And that's the best part of looking back at 2021 and ahead to 2022.
